Cost: Because fees vary based on services desired, and are subject to change without

notification, we have elected to omit specific cost information and instead provide a general idea of cost when possible. It is best to use the information provided as a rough estimate, then call to determine the exact price when you make reservations.

Medical: It is important that every camper be properly insured. As well, each leader should

have a release form with a parent's or a guardian's signature in case of emergency. We recommend that you use the health and medical form issued by the Boy Scouts of America. For more information, consult the Scoutmasters Handbook or contact

your Council office.

Uniform: The Boy Scout Uniform is a universally recognized item of clothing. When scouts

travel in a group, they should wear their uniform. In addition to identifying you as

Scouts, this may entitle your troop to special privileges or discounts.

Public Image: Because the Boy Scouts are well known, the scouts should conduct themselves in

Through March 14, reservations will be taken between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. From March 15 through Labor Day the reservation service will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. weekdays and 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

This Is the Largest New York State Park, With 65,000 Acres,

424 Campsites, 150 Winterized Cabins, And 90 Miles of Hiking Trails.

The Red House Area is known for the historic tudor-style Administration Building and everything centrally located around the Red House Lake. It offers 5 miles of paved bike paths, boat and bike rentals, a sandy beach for swimming, fishing and snowmobiling. Feel free to exercise by walking, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, playing softball tennis, horse shoes or even a game of volleyball. The Administration Building features a natural history museum, regional headquarters and a gift shop. Thunder Rocks is an impressive bedrock city that allows for the nature lover to see the hidden beauty that this park is known for. The Stone Tower structure shows vistas of the rolling hills of mature forests. The many beaver ponds are a good place to observe the diversity of wildlife located in the park.

Bowman Lake State Park is a 966.94-acre remote sylvan retreat known as "a camper's paradise." Scenic park roads wind through evergreen and hardwood forests to shady campsites. There is a sandy lakefront for swimmers and sunbathers with several picnic areas nearby. The lake is regularly stocked with trout, and birdwatchers can spot as many as 103 species of birds. The park also has a nature center. In winter, snowmobilers and cross-country skiers enjoy outstanding scenery on 13 miles of designated trails

The lower park has a campground, natural pool and playing fields, beyond which is Larch Meadows. Larch Meadows is a wetland area through which a nature trail winds

Letchworth State Park, renowned as the "Grand Canyon of the East," is one of the most scenically magnificent areas in the eastern U.S. The Genesee River roars through the gorge over three major waterfalls between cliffs--as high as 600 feet in some places-surrounded by lush forests. Hikers can choose among 66 miles of hiking trails. Trails are also available for horseback riding, biking, snowmobiling and cross-country skiing. Letchworth offers nature, history and performing arts programs, guided walks, tours, a summer lecture series, whitewater rafting, kayaking, a pool for swimming and hot air ballooning.

The 55-acre Arctic Lake has a sand beach for swimmers, and anglers can fish for black bass, bullheads and rainbow trout. The rolling, wooded hills are ideal for winter sledding. Winter visitors can also ice fish on the frozen lake and snow-shoers and cross-country skiers can explore ten miles of trails. If you like to camp, 90 nonelectric sites are available. If you don't want to bother to pack a tent and equipment, you may be interested in the Full-Service Accommodation. This cottage provides 2 bedrooms, a kitchen with a refrigerator, stove, cooking utensils dishes and silverware and more.

Taughannock Falls State Park's namesake waterfall is one of the outstanding natural attractions of the Northeast. Gorge and rim trails offer spectacular views from above the falls and from below at the end of the gorge trail. Campsites and cabins overlook Cayuga Lake, with marina, boat launch and beach nearby. A multi-use trail-hiking, cross-country skiing--winds past sledding slopes and natural skating ponds. The park offers organized activities including tours through the Taughannock Gorge and summer concerts along the lakefront.

Watkins Glen State Park is the most famous of the Finger Lakes State Parks, with a reputation for leaving visitors spellbound. Within two miles, the glen's stream descends 400 feet past 200-foot cliffs, generating 19 waterfalls along its course. The gorge path winds over and under waterfalls and through the spray of Cavern Cascade. Rim trails overlook the gorge. Campers and day-visitors can enjoy the Olympic-size pool, scheduled summer tours through the gorge, tent and trailer campsites, picnic facilities and excellent fishing in nearby Seneca Lake or Catherine Creek, which is renowned for its annual spring run of rainbow trout.

The 1,819-acre South Bradford State Forest features a portion of the Finger Lakes Hiking Trail and is the northern end of the Crystal Hills Branch Hiking Trail. This forest also has significant mineral activity, visitors should expect to see natural gas wellheads and pipelines. Today, South Bradford and all state forests in New York are managed for multiple benefits to serve the needs of the people of New York. Sustainable management practices will ensure a perpetual supply of timber, a diversity of wildlife habitats, compatible recreational opportunities and clean water.

Blueberry Patch Campground is a small, semi-primitive campground located along Picnic Area Road (County Route 2), next to the large blueberry patch it received its name from. This is a popular spot to gather berries when they are in season. The berry patch features the high bush as well as low bush blueberries. There are nine campsites available. Each has a fire pit, a tent pad, a picnic table, and parking for up to two cars. This campground is designed for tents or small campers under 24 feet long. Some of the picnic tables are handicap accessible. There are two handicap accessible vault toilet

Features: Primitive camping, fishing, hiking, hunting, skiing, mainly heavily wooded area.

some hunting and fishing.

Recreational opportunities in this forest focus on rustic experiences with a limited amount of development. The Bristol Hills Branch of the Finger Lakes Trail gives good access to the northerly and central portions of the forest. The Yates Snow Travelers Association (YASTA) maintains a snowmobile trail in the southern portion of the forest

Most of this forest will require significant walking to access. The forest is popular for all types of hunting.

Users should exercise extra caution when accessing stream corridors. Gentle streams become steep sided gullies very quickly in this area. The shale bedrock which forms the bottom of most of these gullies can be very slippery.

Directions: Take Route 17 to Route 54 north and 54A to Branchpo Route. Head west on Route 301
